## DuPage County & Dominican Republic

Jesus said in Mark 10:45 that the “Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve and give his life for many.” That means **following Jesus includes serving others**. OnMission Trips are also a chance for students to gain the experience of serving with each other. We will support local churches and communities (DuPage onMission) and serve alongside an the Envision team (international workers) supporting local churches and working on the Alliance church’s youth facility (Dominican onMission).

**That’s our plan as we go onMission!**

### WHEN & WHERE

**DuPage:** June 25-30, 2017 (Sunday-Friday). We will be serving with Peace of Christ Church

**Dominican Republic:** July 8/9-15/16, 2017 (Sunday-Sunday). We will be serving in Santiago de Los Caballeros with our CMA Envision Team.

*\*\*\*Note: Students can attend both trips if both are paid for in full.*

### WHO CAN ATTEND

**DuPage:** *Current 7th -12th grade students who regularly participate at Bloomingdale Church*

**Dominican Republic:** *Current 9th-12th grade students who regularly participate at Bloomingdale Church*

### COST

- **DuPage - \$250**
- **Dominican Republic - No more than \$1400** (depending on airfare)

### WHY ONMISSION TRIPS?

OnMission trips help us connect to God's local and global work in the world. As we partner with local and international workers, our short term work is done with the hopes that long term change will happen someday. OnMission trips help enrich our personal understanding of God's mission of making disciples as the task we pursue wherever we are.

#### HOW WE CHOOSE WHERE TO SERVE

**We are prayerful and strategic on *where* we serve and *who* we partner with:**

1. We partner with ministries that serve in that same community (the other 51 weeks of the year.)
2. We consider the age-appropriateness of the ministry; balancing being effective while also finding ministry that is challenging.
3. We believe that students can (and should) learn about ministry locally, regionally, and internationally. (Acts 1:8 ...and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem (Bloomingdale), and in all Judea (DuPage) and Samaria (Chicago/U.S.), and to the ends of the earth.)
4. We are drawn to “God’s mission”, more than “our own adventure.”

# ATTENDEE REQUIREMENTS

- *Current* 7th-12h grade students who regularly attend Bloomington Church
- A regular participant in *at least three of the following* (in the year leading up to the trip):
  - Regularly attend weekend worship services
  - Regularly attend Sunday Morning Youth Group
  - Regularly participate in a Small Group
  - Attend Friday Night Coffeehouse
  - Serve on a ministry team (ie Awana, Children's Church, Media Team) or in the community
  - Being officially mentored
- *Serve at Day Camp* (June 12-16) or *at least four other serving options* (e.g. Silent Light, Spring Fest (April, TBD), Party in the Park (June 16)).
- *Complete an interview* with Danny Muñoz/Nate Kugel. (The goal is to ask you why you want to attend the trip and ask a few questions about your faith in Jesus.)
- Attend mandatory trip trainings
  - DuPage: Attend a minimum of two out of the three mandatory trip trainings:
    - Sun March 19, 10am- 2pm
    - Sat April 8, 12-2pm
    - Sun May 21, 12pm-2pm
  - Dominican Republic: Attend all three mandatory trip trainings. (Because this is an international trip, it is essential to attend all trainings. There will be no leeway here, unless it is a family emergency or extreme illness.)
    - Sun March 19, 10-12pm
    - Sat April 8, 12-2pm
    - Sun May 21, 12-2pm

# SERVING POSSIBILITIES IN DUPAGE

- Partner with local organizations to meet ongoing needs in the community.
- Students may serve at a food pantry, clothing distribution center, soup kitchen, children's program, doing landscaping and grounds work, or elderly care facilities.
- Students may run a Day Camp (VBS) for K-6th graders, including crafts, group games, performing skits, teaching Bible lessons, leading a certain age group of kids around to the different stations.
- Students will be encouraged to connect with God through morning devos, evening worship gatherings and small groups.

# SERVING IN DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

## ABOUT THE SITE

Envision DR is situated in Santiago. Santiago de los Caballeros (English: Saint James of the Gentlemen) is the second largest metropolis in the Dominican Republic, located in the north-central region of the Republic known as Cibao Valley. Being able to immerse ourselves in the culture, with the people, and ministering to those around us gives us a glimpse of what international workers do. We want our experience to have sustainable impact on the Kingdom

as we work with the overseas team. We'll come alongside the Dominican National Alliance Church, giving the Dominicans resources that will help them in reaching their communities. Our hope is that we'll fall in love with God's people in the DR, while working alongside pastors, and people of the churches.

### MEET THE ENVISION DR TEAM

Brandon and Bethany Nutter have been serving with Envision since the spring of 2014. Originally serving as site associate coordinators, the Nutters moved into the site coordinator role in early 2015. Before serving with Envision, Brandon was an Alliance pastor for 10 years in two different churches as a youth/associate pastor, and Bethany was a middle-school teacher for 6 of those years. While in the pastor-ate, the Nutters led multiple short-term trips overseas because of the great value they saw in how it impacted their church members' lives. The littlest team members are Andrew (9), Benjamin (6) & Lily Nutter (4). They love having teams and interns come to the site, and jumping in on all the activities.

### VISION OF THE SITE

- Our role is to partner with the national Alliance Church in the Dominican. The Envision DR Teams works closely with the National President as well as the local District Superintendent and the elders to determine projects and ministry opportunities.
- The Dominican currently has around 100 churches with a vision to plant many more. They are always seeking new ways to minister, which could mean teaching English, opening a cafe, helping to plant churches, and many other possibilities.
- All ministries and outreaches through the local Alliance churches, in hopes of strengthening and furthering their reach.
- In working through them, the fruit of our short-term team will remain long after the groups are gone. Our vision is to see maximum fruit and impact!

## TRAVEL

### DUPAGE

- **We will be traveling in passenger van(s).**
  - TBD - 30-45min away
  - Drive to showers, offsite serving, and evening activities

### DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

- **We will be flying into Cibao International Airport (STI).**
  - When we arrive, there will be an Envision team member to pick us up. When we get off the plane, we'll come down the stairs and buy our tourist visas before going through customs. We will then get our luggage and come outside to meet the person picking you up.
- **Visas & Passports**
  - If you do not have a passport, you will need to get one at by Sunday, January 29th.
  - We do not need to do anything for a visa for a 7-day missions trip. Upon arrival at the Santiago airport, we will purchase tourist visas at \$10/person (built into cost).

# HOUSING & PERSONAL CARE

## Dupage

- **We will be staying at a community church TBD.**
- The sleeping arrangements will be split by gender in the different classrooms.
  - Adult leaders will be staying in rooms with students.
  - Students are only allowed in same gender rooms.
  - Each student will need a sleeping bag as we will be staying on the floor.
- Showers will be encouraged every day at the designated location by our host church!
- We will follow all of the rules and will represent Christ well with our actions.

## Dominican Republic

- **Our housing will be in a dorm-style building at the DR Envision site.**
- For breakfast, the dorm staff serves a variety of American and Dominican items for breakfast such as french toast, eggs, sausage, mangu, fresh natural juices, coffee and more. For teams, lunch is our most basic meal, as we eat on the job site. We pack lunches in igloo coolers before we leave in the morning with sandwiches, cookies, chips & veggies. Dinner is our favorite meal as the local staff prepares some of our favorite Dominican meals.

# ADULT YOUTH VOLUNTEERS

- **Nate is the point-leader for the DuPage trip. Danny is the point-leader for the Dominican Republic trip.**
- Adult Youth Leaders (who currently serve as vetted youth leaders in our youth ministry) graciously commit to attend our trips to provide leadership, safety, a listening ear, and encouragement to our students and families.
  - Adult Youth Leaders are selected by the the Youth Staff only.
  - Adult leaders will be announced as we determine how many students commit to attending the trip. (We will publicly announce this information. Please do not start rumors.)
- **We will have a minimum of 1 leader to 7 student ratio.**

# COMMUNICATION

## PRE-TRIP COMMUNICATION

- *We will send a semi-regular **email** via CBC containing trip and fundraising info.*
- *We will occasionally send reminders via text message too.*

## SAFETY

For the protection of every attendee, the following safety guidelines will be observed:

- **Always follow the site leader’s instructions.** They have been on site for several months and know the area and what we can and cannot do.
- We will provide a 24-hour emergency contact number.
- **You must always be with a leader at all times.** No exceptions.

## TRIP BEHAVIOR

### ACTIONS & CONSEQUENCES

If a student chooses to not follow the specific rules of the leaders on an offsite retreat/trip:

- 1st offense: student will contact their parents and explain his/her choices
- 2nd offense: student will be sent home on his/her own expense
  - We reserve the right to send a student home immediately. We will abide by Youth Work’s policy that the cost will be on the student and their parent/guardian to cover the cost of sending the student home.
  - Community Alliance’s staff site leaders may decide that a certain action or incident, (even not seen by one of the BC trip leaders), may be a “send-home”-able offense. They will bring it to Nate’s attention and a collaborative decision will be made.

### ZERO TOLERANCE

- No violence; harassment; possession of drugs, alcohol, tobacco, or weapons
- If you suspect something out of place, immediately tell an adult.

### ELECTRONICS POLICY

Retreats are an opportunity to not only “retreat” from our busy schedules, but also “retreat” from our continual use of electronics.

*Cell phones are allowed, if the following are observed on retreats and onMission trips:*

- You may use your cell phone to contact your parent during free-time, if you receive permission.
- You may keep your cell phone for emergency use.
- You must share your cell phone number with the leader (via permission form).

*The following cell phone/mobile device use is not allowed:*

- Texting, watching media, playing games, online, social media, and using apps.
- Using your cell phone/mobile device during teaching sessions, seminars, or any group time (except a “Bible App”).

*Students who chose to use their cell phone/mobile device will be asked to give the device to their leader. 1st offense: remainder of day; 2nd offense: remainder of trip.*

Students may use an adult leader’s phone to call home when appropriate.

***Bloomington Church is not responsible for stolen items.***

## **SLEEP**

The purpose of this trip is to learn about our faith and respond to what God is teaching us. We cannot do this when we sleep during the day. ***Sleeping at night is always a priority.***

## **COMMUNITY COVENANT**

*The Bible says, "We are the aroma of Christ" (2 Cor. 2:15). This means that people can "smell" who Jesus is through the actions of us, His followers. We represent God in how we act, talk, and dress. We want to be a safe community where all students feel included and Christ is honored.*

- We will be respectful of God, to each other, and to ourselves.
- We will use appropriate language with one another.
  - Swearing, gossiping, and speaking negatively does not give people value.)

### ***Public Display of Affection [PDA]***

- We will keep our contact brief and appropriate with others.
- Kissing, extended hugging, hand-holding, sitting on one another, and being in a room alone together are not appropriate and create situations that are uncomfortable for the community around us.

### ***Clothing***

*If you can bend over and touch your toes without showing any skin or underwear in the back, then your shirt and pants are okay. If you can raise your hands all the way above your head and not show your stomach or underwear, then your shirt is okay.)*

**Girls** Tops: Please wear tank tops instead of spaghetti straps. If the shirt has a low v-neck, shows your midriff, or has an open back, please put a shirt underneath it. Bottoms: Skirts need to be at least mid-thigh length. Please do not wear shorts/pants with words on the rear. Swimwear: No bikinis, but tankinis are okay if the top and bottom pieces are close together. Bathing suits with a tank top over is a good choice too..

**Boys** Shirts must be worn at all times unless at the beach. No speedos at the beach. No low hanging pants please.'

### ***Working***

*We are going there to work, get dirty, and honor God. We encourage you to bring clothing you wouldn't mind getting messy or ruined while still following the dress code stated above.*

### ***Additional Dominican Republic Guidelines***

*Please be aware that the people in DR are much more conservative than we are in the States. To be effective in ministry, we must respect our Dominican brothers and sisters while in their country. We must set aside our dress and customs, and adopt those of the country in which we are serving. We take this seriously and will make team members change if they are not dressed appropriately. Here are some helpful guidelines to make our ministry most effective:*

- For both guys and girls, we have a "shoulders to knees" policy; you must be covered from your shoulders all the way to your knees. This means no tank tops, sleeveless or

cut-off shirts, and shorts must actually come down to the knee (fingertip length is not acceptable). This applies to everywhere we go and everything we do. The only exceptions are when we go to the beach on Sunday and in dorm bedrooms.

- No body piercing/body jewelry (all piercings for guys, and anything but earrings for girls must be removed).
- No tight-fitting clothes (including yoga pants or leggings).
- For prayer walks and Tuesday night church: Girls can wear a dress or a nice shirt with pants/skirt. Sandals or clean shoes can be worn. Guys need to wear pants and a short sleeve button up or polo with clean shoes (no sandals).
- For construction: Jeans or shorts may be worn with t-shirts and work shoes. Expect to get very dirty.
- For VBS or English classes: Pants or shorts may be worn with a t-shirt and clean shoes or sandals. Girls can wear a dress or skirt/shirt if they prefer. If your construction clothes remain relatively clean, you can wear those in the afternoon.

# GETTING READY FOR THE TRIP

## Parent/Student Meeting: Sunday, October 23rd 2016

This meeting will be held during Sunday Morning Youth Group at 9:45am in the Youth Quad and will be an opportunity to ask questions and hear more details regarding the trip. Parents are highly encouraged to attend this meeting as the information provided will be beneficial, and commitments can also be made.

## PACKING

- Packing lists for both trips will be shared in May/June 2017.

## SPENDING MONEY

The trip is all inclusive. However, should your student choose bring spending money for souvenirs and snacks apparel or an evening activity, Bloomingtondale Church (nor its leaders) is not responsible for lost or stolen money.

# TRIP HEALTH

## MEDICATIONS

- Parents/Guardians are responsible for sharing information about any allergies their students have by emailing [youth@bloomingtondalechurch.org](mailto:youth@bloomingtondalechurch.org) or updating their student's profile on CBC (only viewable to leaders).
- If a student needs to bring medications:
  - Parents/Guardians must email [youth@bloomingtondalechurch.org](mailto:youth@bloomingtondalechurch.org) before the trip to let us know they will be bringing the medication, what it is for, and what the schedule for taking it is. (This information will be kept confidential among the leaders.)



## TRIP MED BAG

Bloomington Church brings a first aid bag to all offsite trips. Students should see an adult leader if they need any minor medical attention.

*If you (parents/guardians) do not want Ibuprofen or Acetaminophen to be administered to your child, please update your student's CBC account (edit profile, then add the info in the "allergies" section) or email [youth@bloomingtonchurch.org](mailto:youth@bloomingtonchurch.org).*

## VACCINES

The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) has health recommendations and requirements for travel. For more details check out their website ([www.cdc.gov](http://www.cdc.gov)) or contact your local health department. See your doctor at least 4-6 weeks before your trip.

Recommended Vaccines:

1. Hepatitis A
2. Hepatitis B
3. Typhoid
4. Booster doses for Tetanus-Diphtheria and Measles

# CULTURAL SENSITIVITY

## A BIT ABOUT THE DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

The Alliance has had an active presence in the Dominican Republic since the mid-1960s when Dominicans living in New York, along with other Hispanic immigrants, sacrificially gave of their time and resources to take the Christ-centered message of the C&MA to their homeland. The church took root and grew, even with the absence of trained pastors or international workers.

In the 1980s, The Alliance sent full-time international workers to the country to work alongside Dominican believers to provide much-needed leadership and theological training and to expand the church into people groups with little evangelical presence.

Today, Alliance workers are involved in a variety of ministries, in many cases working alongside Dominican believers to build Christian communities throughout the country.

From the very roots of the Dominican Alliance Church, the US Alliance has had a deep bond with our brothers and sisters. Envision has the unique privilege of deepening and strengthening those bonds by bringing short-term teams to partner with and assist the local church, as well as take the gospel to every part of the island that has yet to be reached.

- *Students will only receive money in their Student Account for the fundraising activities in which they participate.*
- It is a student's decision which and how many fundraisers they do.
- Please understand that our Youth Staff and Adult Youth Leader's primary role is spiritual care and leadership. Therefore, we encourage parental support.

### **Coffee Sales** [Fall, 7th-12th grade]

Students will receive a sales packet in September (in church mailbox; at Youth Group; online). Sales must be turned in by predetermined dates in September and October.

### **Winter Banquet** [Must have made commitment to summer onMission trip to participate]

Students prepare throughout December and January. Must be available Thursday-Saturday evening of event to participate. Parent support is necessary. Event is last Fri/Sat in January.

### **Plant Sales** [Spring, 7th-12th grade]

Students will receive a sales packet in March (in church mailbox; at Youth Group; online). Sales must be turned in by pre-determined date in mid-April. All participants and their guardian/parent must participate in the delivery day (2nd or 3rd Saturday in May).

### **Rent-A-Teen** [7th-12th grade]

Ask neighbors and family if they have any labor in which you can help. Place the cash or check (made out to Bloomingtondale Church Youth Group) in an envelope with a Trip Tix in the Student Account mailbox.

### **BCRentateen** [7th-12th grade]

Throughout the year, various needs within the church or from church members can be assisted by students, funded by Youth Group budget (and the Deacons when applicable.)

- Students will be called for specific opportunities as they become available.
  - Students who demonstrate a positive work-ethic will be contacted first.
- Students must ask the supervising adult and Youth Staff to sign "Trip Tix" and then turn into gym office mailbox to receive credit.

### **Donations/Payment** [7th-12th grade]

Cash/check donations made to a student for their trip. (Money given to an individual is not tax-deductible.)

- Cash/Check: Place the cash or check (made out to Bloomingtondale Church Youth Group) in an envelope with a Trip Tix in the Student Account mailbox.

## TRIP COST

**DuPage** onMission trip cost is \$250. It is broken down as follows:

- Site Cost
- Travel Gas/Rental Vans
- Trip T-Shirt

*Optional: Evening Snack*

**Dominican Republic** International onMission trip cost is \$1400. It is broken down as follows:

- \$700 per individual on the ground in the country for 7 days.
- The in-country expenses cover travel insurance, food, lodging, construction materials and tools for your work projects, most ministry and media equipment for your ministries, Spanish music, coordination of all your ministries and work projects, Spanish translation help, and our on-site presence and assistance at all times.
- Trip T-Shirt
- Up to \$700 per individual to cover roundtrip airfare.

# TRIP COMMITMENT

## COMMITMENT FORM & DEPOSIT

*To attend the **DuPage** onMission 2017 trip, a student and their parent/guardian must:*

1. Fill out the (paper) DuPage onMission 2017 Commitment form and place in the gym office Student Account mailbox by March 1st.
2. Authorize a \$75 non-refundable deposit:
  - a. Turn in check/cash with Commitment form (to gym office mailbox)
  - b. (or) Authorize \$75 from your Student Account. (You must have the money in your Student Account; no IOU's).

*To attend the **Dominican Republic** onMission 2017 trip, a student and their parent/guardian must:*

1. Fill out the (paper) Dominican Republic onMission 2017 Commitment form and place in the gym office Student Account mailbox by January 8th.
2. Authorize a \$250 (Early Bird \$100 by Oct 2nd) non-refundable deposit:
  - c. Turn in check/cash with Commitment form (to gym office mailbox)
  - d. (or) Authorize \$250 (Early Bird \$100 by Oct 2nd) from your Student Account. (You must have the money in your Student Account; no IOU's).

## COMMITMENT DEADLINE

***Students must turn in 1) onMission Commitment 2) Deposit***

- DuPage Commitment/Deposit due: **Sun March 1**
- Dominican Republic Commitment/Deposit due: **Sun Jan 8th**

*We strongly urge families to make the commitment early:*

- Get a head start on fundraising
- Help us know if you are committed to the trip! We will intentionally send you updates on the trip when you have made the commitment.
- Be included in trip update emails.
- **Receive \$25 credit toward either trip if you make your deposit by Sun Oct 2nd.**

# TRIP PAYMENTS

## THREE MANDATORY DEADLINES

- Payment deadlines keep students on track for paying for their trip.
- The Youth Group has numerous deadlines for pre-trip payments to vendors and cannot fulfill them without available funds.

***Payment deadlines are mandatory to retain a spot on the trip.***

- *The money must be turned in by the assigned deadline or the student will forfeit their trip attendance.*

- Students/parents will be given a monthly Student Account update. When a deadline approaches, we will do our best to notify any family if their student is below the minimum.

***If a student chooses not to have the minimum amount in their Student Account by the deadline, they will not be reimbursed for any amount under the minimum amount for that deadline.***

***DuPage - Students must have the following amounts in their Student Accounts:***

- Sun Oct 2 Early Bird: Receive \$25 credit if commitment *and* \$75 deposit completed
- \$75: Sun March 1 (Final Signup Date)
- \$150: Sun May 1st
  - \$150 includes deposit, coffee fundraiser, Winter Banquet, and other fundraising activities
- \$250: Sun June 1
  - \$250 includes deposit, plant fundraiser and other fundraising activities

***Dominican Republic - Students must have the following amounts in their Student Accounts:***

- Sun Oct 2 Early Bird: Receive \$25 credit if commitment *and* \$250 deposit completed
- \$250: Sun January 8 (Final Signup Date)
  - \$250 includes deposit & coffee fundraiser
- \$600: Sun March 19
  - \$600 includes deposit, coffee fundraiser, Winter Banquet, and other fundraising activities
- \$1000: Sun April 23
  - \$1000 includes deposit, plant fundraiser and other fundraising activities
- \$1400: Sun June 4
  - \$1400 includes deposit, and all other fundraising activities

## STUDENT ACCOUNTS

- Our Youth Ministry Bookkeeping Team (comprised of parent volunteers) keeps track of every student's fundraising account (7th-12th grade).
  - *You will receive periodic updates on your student's total leading up to the final payment date.*
- Student Accounts funds *cannot*:
  - Be retrieved for non-retreat use.
  - Be retrieved at the completion of high school.
  - Be transferred to another student's account (unless siblings).
